



Honor Rancho Compressor Modernization Project



SoCalGas is making targeted investments at the Honor Rancho Storage Facility to modernize critical infrastructure and meet South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) emission requirements. These changes will reduce emissions, strengthen system reliability, and support safe, affordable energy for customers and communities.

Operating safely and reliably since 1976, the Honor Rancho Storage Facility continues to play a critical role in supporting natural gas reliability and electric system resiliency in the Santa Clarita Valley and greater Los Angeles area.

Project Overview

The project includes installing advanced electric-driven compressors, complemented by modern natural gas-fueled compressors, to significantly reduce nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions and improve operational performance. Southern California Edison (SCE) will also be installing new electric infrastructure to support the project.

Construction is currently underway, including site preparation of existing facilities and grading for new infrastructure to improve operational performance. Work is carefully managed to minimize impacts such as noise and traffic. SoCalGas will continue coordinating with local agencies and providing updates to the community.

Project Benefits

- **95% reduction in permitted NOx emissions***
- Enhance reliability by modernizing aging equipment
- Comply with SCAQMD Rules 1110.2/1100 (stationary engines)
